Curriculum Multiple Disciplines in the COR Proposal Revision

Process Proposal 1

- 1. Classes with a prefix that matches the discipline will require no additional paperwork in Curriculum Committee nor will it be required to go to Academic Senate
- 2. If the discipline/s don't match the course prefix, then it goes to the Academic Senate*
- 3. Cross-listed courses and interdisciplinary courses would require paperwork in Curriculum Committee and would need to go to Academic Senate*
- 4. If the prefix is not associated with a discipline on the established disciplines list the course would go to the Academic Senate*

*Senate would receive a form noting what course is requesting what disciplines, justification for the request, and have a signature from all departments involved verifying the information has been discussed and approved by the department(s). Academic Senate can approve or reject requests. Courses then go back to Curriculum Committee for approval. This process occurs for any full revisions done on any courses requesting multiple disciplines.

Note for clarification on the current Curriculum Committee process for new courses:

Any new courses presented in Curriculum Committee go through a minimum of two meetings for discussion and review - a 1st reading and discussion of the course and a 2nd reading and potential vote.

Timing Proposal 1 (Proposal received from Academic Senate)

- 1. Discussion of the course at Curriculum Committee, vote, and recommendation
- 2. First read to Academic Senate, approval. If timing is an issue (or Academic Senate is unavailable), the Academic Senate President and Senate Executive Committee can approve the course
- 3. Second read to Curriculum Committee

Timing Proposal 2 (Curriculum Committee's counterproposal)

- 1. Discussion of the course at Curriculum Committee and vote (potentially one meeting if it is not a new course)
- 2. Curriculum Chair would submit the signed form to Academic Senate for review and approval
- 3. The course would not be moved forward in Elumen or sent to the Board of Trustees until Academic Senate has approved the course
- 4. If Academic Senate does not approve the course, Curriculum Committee would revisit the course based on Academic Senate feedback
