- When we come back in January, Dr. Carlson will work on forming a community committee to discuss and begin working on future capital projects such as Jamison Stadium (outside of the designated funds for the Measure J Bond/Prop. 51). These future capital projects are being planned, and will be incorporated into the Educational Master Plan (EMP) which is in progress.

VI. Bond Discussion

Porterville College has an exhaustive list of projects which now totals \$192,534,302. The funding from Measure J will not be enough to complete all the projects on our needs list, but as soon as a funding allocation and distribution schedule has been identified it will allow us to move forward with the construction of a new Allied Health Facility and other Capital and Scheduled Maintenance Projects outlined in the Bond Campaign. Early estimates are that we should start to see State funding from Proposition 51 by mid- 2018. We will have to have a representative serve on a Bond Oversight Committee. For Measure J – it will need to be a community member and not a PC staff. Milt Stowe, current PC Foundation Board Member and Porterville Mayor, now serves on the ending Measure G Oversight Committee. A new community member will need to be found to serve on the Measure J Bond Oversight Committee.

ERM Implementation Continues

The implementation of Enterprise Risk Management (ERM) is continuing throughout the Kern Community College District. This quarter brought additional presentations to district and campus leaders along with our first meeting with the Safety and Security Team (SST) at Bakersfield College. The SST's are where the ERM "rubber meets the road." Since the meeting at BC, held in Levinson 40, on September 14, 2016, several risks have been identified and

progress is being made to address or mitigate those risks.

As part of the implementation process, prior to the safety committee group meeting, which will be taking place on October

12, individual team member meetings are being conducted. During the course of a meeting with faculty member Christian Parker, who is sight impaired, it was revealed how a simple thing like a golf cart parked on a sidewalk in his routine path can throw him off and literally cause him to be disoriented and become lost. To help alleviate this situation, ERM arranged to have Mr. Parker attend and speak at the next Maintenance and Operations meeting so that he can provide his perspective on the importance of maintaining clear sidewalks on campus for those who may have various types of impairments. We'll also be able to discuss the possibility of notifying him, and other visually impaired people on campus, in advance of construction work and other temporary disruptions that occur on campus.

We'll be meeting with the SST at CC on October 11, and at PC in the very near future.

Getsafetytrained Kick-Off

The first phase of *Getsafetytrained (GST)* was launched on September 13, 2016. GST is a valuable resource to our employees that provides online safety training in multiple job categories that have a regulatory requirement for employees to safely perform their duties.

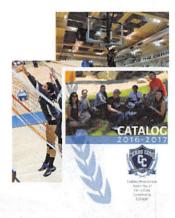
GST is offered at no charge through our insurance provider, Self-Insured Schools of California. Providing this training live or contracting through other providers would otherwise cost the district thousands

The first phase of the process requires all employees to register for GST through Banner accessed on the KCCD, BC, CC or PC homepages. See Ms. Shearer's email dated September 13, for instructions. The October 1, deadline for registration has been extended. The sooner we get everybody registered the sooner we start using this valuable program!





Steven Alexander, the Director of IT Security reminds us, that when registering on GST, use a password that you don't use anywhere else in your computer travels because GST stores your password in plain text and unencrypted which could result in an exposure.

Active Shooter Tabletop Exercise at Porterville College

On Friday, September 9, 2016, an Active Shooter online tabletop exercise was conducted with the Incident Command System Team at Porterville College. The exercise was facilitated by Disaster Resistant Communities Group LLC. The PC ICS Team did a great job of responding to the event in a careful, thoughtful and safe manner. Of course lessons were learned, as lessons should be learned in any simulation, but over-all the event was handled well and students, families of students and staff at PC can rest a little easier knowing that the leadership at their institution is able to effectively respond to an incident such as an active shooter.

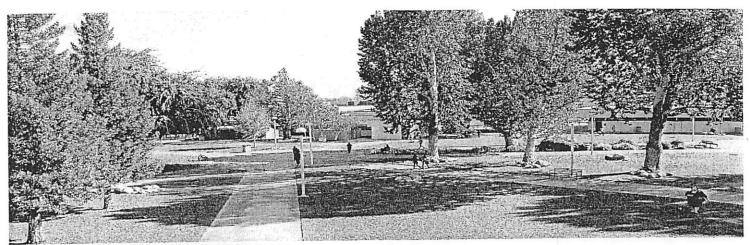

Goals/Objectives:

- To get staff/students thinking about the ways to remain safe on campus

Safety Scenarios

- 1. It's 9:00 p.m. and you walking to your car in a campus parking from class. What should you do? What could you have done to avoid this position in the first place?
- 2. You receive a physical threat from a partner (spouse, boyfriend, etc) during an argument that occurred on-campus? What should you do before leaving the campus?
- 3. You are sexually assaulted during an off-campus (ASPC Convening/CCCCO Workshop) work or student overnight trip event? Who should you contact to report the assault? What actions can you take to preserve evidence of the incident? What could possibly happen as a result of you reporting the incident?

Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter: the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. NOTE: Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded.

Negligent Manslaughter: the killing of another person through gross negligence.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even though the vehicles are later abandoned – including joy riding).

Arson: The willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another kind.

Liquor Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Drug Abuse Violations: Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Weapon Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Porterville College is also required to report statistics for hate (bias) related crimes by the type of bias as defined below for the following classifications: murder/non-negligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, sex offenses (forcible and non-forcible), robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arson, liquor law violations, drug violations and/or illegal weapons possession (see definitions on the front page) and larceny, vandalism, intimidation and simple assault (see definitions below).

Larceny: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Vandalism: To willfully or maliciously destroy, injure, disfigure, or deface any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

Intimidation: To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

Simple Assault: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration or loss of consciousness.

If a hate crime occurs where there is an incident involving intimidation, vandalism, larceny, simple assault or other bodily injury, the law requires that the statistic be reported as a hate crime even though there is no requirement to report the crime classification in any other area of the compliance document.

A hate or bias related crime is not a separate, distinct crime, but is the commission of a criminal offense which was motivated by the offender's bias. For example, a subject assaults a victim, which is a crime. If the facts of the case indicate that the offender was motivated to commit the offense because of his/her bias against the victim's race, religion, sexual orientation, gender, ethnicity/national origin, or disability, the assault is then also classified as a hate/bias crime.
